 - nomination of experts to participate on ISO technical committee and subcommittee working groups (including ISO/IEC JTC 1)
 - maintenance of TAG MoAs

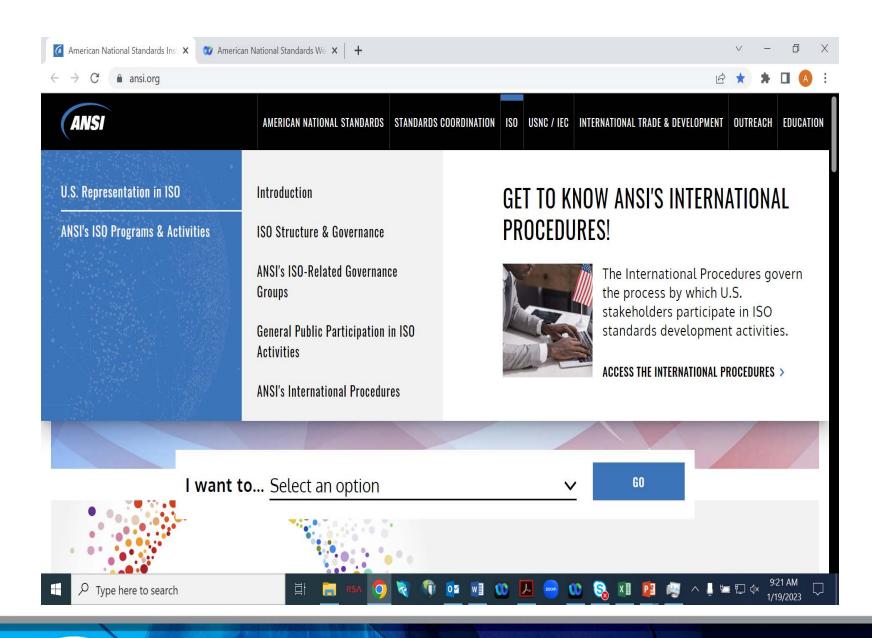

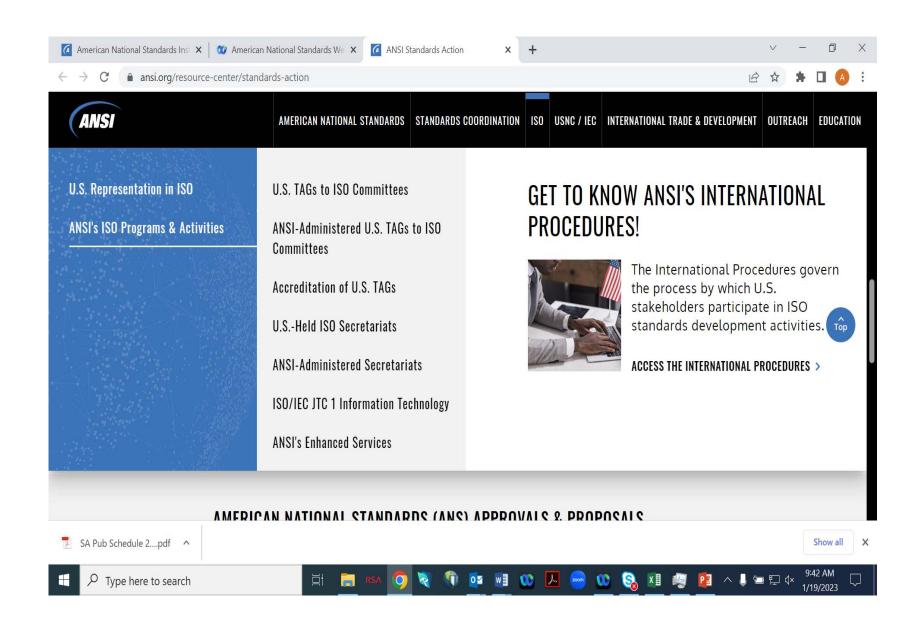

ANSI ExSC:

- Accredits U.S. TAGs to ISO, receives and processes accreditation applications
- Maintains & interprets the ANSI International Procedures
 - ✓ Including TAG model procedures (Annex A), Annex B & Annex C
- Issues guidance
- Hears related appeals, after the TAG appeals process concludes
- Decides on actions related to special audits, including audits for cause
- Oversees the ANSI Standards Developer Audit Program
- Implements re-accreditation process re: revised procedures (review and approval of substantive revisions to accredited procedures)
- Issues, receives and tracks U.S. TAG to ISO and ISO/IEC JTC1 Annual Compliance Forms
- Receives and tracks U.S. TAG to ISO and ISO/IEC JTC1 Annual Reports





Let's review our focus today: U.S. TAG to ISO, ISO/IEC JTC1 & U.S. TAG Administrators

- United States Technical Advisory Groups: U.S. Technical Advisory Groups (TAGs) are committees accredited by ANSI for participation in ISO technical activities or appointed by the USNC for participation in IEC technical activities, which operate in compliance with the ANSI Criteria for the Development and Coordination of U.S. Positions in the International Standardization Activities of the ISO and IEC. [aka Annex B, International Procedures]
- Such U.S. TAGs are administered by U.S. TAG Administrators, who are appointed by ANSI to be responsible for ensuring compliance with TAG procedures. [i.e., the procedures under which the TAG is accredited – either Annex A or unique procedures]
 - Today's session applies to ANSI-Accredited US TAGs to <u>ISO and ISO/IEC JTC</u>
 1 only
 - US TAGs to IEC are overseen by the USNC, not the ANSI Executive Standards Council (ExSC). USNC Questions: usnc@ansi.org

Once accredited by the ANSI ExSC, what ongoing responsibilities does an ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG and TAG Administrator have?

What is needed to maintain accreditation?

- Maintain compliance with the current edition of the ANSI International Procedures (2025)
- Return TAG Annual Compliance Form/E-mail
- Return TAG Annual Report for prior year with TAG Membership roster
- Submit, when changed, revised TAG procedures to ANSI for review and approval – "reaccreditation" (send to <u>psa@ansi.org</u>)
 - ✓ Strikethrough, underline format with an explanation

What is needed to maintain accreditation? (continued)

- Complete mandatory no-cost training
 - ✓ The Operating Procedures of U.S. TAGs to ISO: Strengthening the U.S. Voice in International Standardization
 - Self-led training modules, available at :
 https://www.ansi.org/education/activities/standards-training-courses-webinars
 - Must be taken once upon assignment, may be taken again
 - ✓ Online course: *ISO Directives Updates*
 - Self-led course posted to :
 - https://www.ansi.org/education/activities/standards-training-courses-webinars
 - Must be taken annually thereafter, released June/July each year
- Note that a separate training requirement applies to organizations that serve as International Secretariats (ISO TC/SC/PC Secretary)

- Comply with the requirements associated with ANSI oversight and supervision.
- Fulfill all financial obligations such as ANSI
 Membership fees, International Activity Assessment fees and P-Membership fees.

ANSI ExSC: TAG Oversight Procedures

- ANSI International Procedures (2025 edition)
 - ✓ Section 2.5.5 *Maintenance of Accreditation* and 2.5.5.2 *Annual Reporting* (Today's focus)
- Operating Procedures of the ANSI Executive Standards Council (ExSC) (2022 edition)
 - ✓ Section 21 ExSC Consideration of Complaints against ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAGs to ISO
- ANSI Auditing Policy and Procedures for ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAGs to ISO
 - ✓ Routine audits of TAGs are not scheduled as they are for ANSI-Accredited Standards Developers, but the ExSC can require an "audit for cause"
 - ✓ Annexes A&B: TAG self-audit option

2025 ANSI International Procedures Revisions



2025 Summary Revisions

- Section 1.6 U.S. Individuals Serving as ISO Chair: Requirements clarified for those cases in which a non-U.S. Chair is nominated.
- Annex B5.1 and Annex C Code of Conduct:
 Revisions to clarify that a Code of Conduct is mandatory and applicable to all TAG Members and observers.

2025: 1.6 U.S. Individuals Serving as ISO Chair

The ISO Directives grant authority to the committee secretariats (TC or SC) to nominate the Chair. ANSI delegates this authority to the ANSI-delegated secretariat organization noting that, pursuant to the ANSI International Procedures, it is a U.S. TAG function to recommend to ANSI U.S. candidates for the Chair of ISO committees. In cases where a U.S. individual is nominated to be Chair where ANSI does not hold the Secretariat, the corresponding U.S. TAG will be consulted. If there is no U.S. TAG, ANSI will be consulted for approval.

U.S. individuals serving in this role must complete mandatory leadership training offered by ANSI and are also expected to participate as a member of the corresponding U.S. TAG, if applicable.

Note: If an ANSI-delegated secretariat nominates a non-US Chair, the corresponding ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG will be consulted and the National Standards Body (NSB) which the non-U.S. Chair represents shall confirm the nomination.

ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG to ISO Code of Conduct (Annex C)

- Recap:
 - ✓ New in 2023, clarified in 2025
 - ✓ Built on ANSI's Code of Conduct and ISO's Code of Conduct
- All ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAGs are <u>already</u> required to implement Annex C or comparable Code of Conduct
 - ✓ Transparent rules and consequences
 - ✓ Promotes productive participation
 - ✓ Sets expectations and consequences for members and observers



2025 Annex C: Model Code of Conduct for Participation on an ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG

This model Code of Conduct²³ may be adopted as is or adapted as part of a TAG Membership application or other document. A TAG Administrator may shall require TAG members and observers to sign agree to comply with a copy of this Code (or comparable document, consistent with the ANSI International Procedures) as a condition of participation. It is recommended that this Code be published and distributed annually along with a copy of the TAG's accredited procedures, links to the ISO/IEC Directives and contact information for the individual(s) serving as TAG Administrator.

Ways to implement Code of Conduct (Annex C)

- ✓ Distribute to current members
- ✓ Distribute to new members when approved, with a copy of the procedures and roster
 - ✓ Distribute these annually to all members
- ✓ Distribute to observers in advance of a meeting
- ✓ Link to every agenda
- ✓ Review at the start of each TAG meeting
- ✓Incorporate into the TAG Membership Application

Let's review the annual compliance E-mail

Purpose of the Annual Compliance E-mail/Form & Annual Report

- Provides a regular opportunity to review:
 - current edition of ANSI International Procedures;
 - TAG's accredited procedures/Model procedures; and
 - any related process documents to ensure full compliance with the updated ANSI International Procedures
- Serves as a binding certification by a TAG
 Administrator of overall procedural compliance
- Annual Report provides an update about TAG activities and confirms awareness of requirements, i.e., it is an ExSC and ANSI oversight tool



Combined 2025 Procedural Compliance E-mail and 2024 TAG Annual Report

- Issued via E-mail December 10, 2024 with a due date of January 31, 2025
- Communicates procedural revisions and serves as a point-in-time confirmation of procedural compliance
- E-mail has 2 parts:
 - Part 1: 2025 Annual Compliance Form
 - Part 2: 2024 TAG Annual Report Form (model)
- Every separately accredited U.S. TAG to an ISO activity is required to submit both parts (see 2.5.4)

Let's talk a bit about: Interest Categories, Affiliation, Sponsor, Consultant (Annexes A & B)

- ✓ Interest categories shall be discretely defined, cover directly and materially interested parties and differentiate each category from the other categories. Such definitions shall be available upon request. (Example of interest categories: User, Producer, General Interest)
- ✓ TAG Members, including consultants, typically are classified in accordance with the business or other interests of their employers or the sponsors they represent in connection with the standards development activity.
 - In cases where a TAG member receives funding from the TAG Administrator or other entities, that information shall be disclosed to determine if it will impact the TAG member's interest classification.

Let's talk a bit about: Interest Categories, Affiliation, Sponsor, Consultant (Annexes A & B)

- ✓ "Affiliation" refers to the entity that the U.S. TAG member represents, which may or may not be that person's employer.
 - ✓ If the TAG member is serving in an individual capacity, then the name of the individual, their sponsors (if any) and interest category shall be made available upon request. Contact information is not required.
- ✓ A sponsor is defined as an organization that provides funds specifically to support the individual's participation in the standards activities of the TAG.
- ✓ For purposes of these procedures, a consultant is someone who agrees to provide professional service in exchange for compensation, financial or otherwise.

- ANSI does not itself develop standards or certify management systems, products, services, materials, or personnel.
- ANSI does not permit, under any circumstances, the use or registration by others of "ANSI," the ANSI wording and crescent design logo ("ANSI Logo"), icon, or any other marks, names, or domain names consisting of or incorporating ANSI or marks owned by ANSI, or anything confusingly similar (individually and collectively "ANSI Marks").

Clarification for reference: ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD) vs. ANSI-Accredited U.S. Technical Advisory Group (TAG)



ASD vs. TAG - Distinctions

- Many ANSI-Accredited Standards Developers (ASDs) also serve as ANSI-Accredited
 U.S. TAG Administrators to ISO TC/SC/PC/WG
- Applicable rules and procedures for each ANSI accredited status are <u>different</u> though hallmarks of the ANS and ISO processes are similar
 - ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD):
 - 1. Governed by: ANSI Essential Requirements: Due process requirements for American National Standards (<u>www.ansi.org/essentialrequirements</u>)
 - 2. ASD's Accredited Procedures
 - ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG to ISO:
 - 1. Governed by: ANSI International Procedures (www.ansi.org/internationalprocedures)
 - 2. ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAG procedures (most use Annex A plus all are bound by Annexes B and C of the *ANSI International Procedures*)
 - 3. ISO Directives & Code of conduct (maintained by ISO)

ASD and TAG – Distinctions (2)

- Participation requirements are distinct
 - U.S. TAG to ISO: participants must satisfy the definition of *US National Interested Party* (not applicable to ANS process)
- U.S. National Interested Party: A U.S. National Interested Party is directly and materially interested in the relevant standards activity and is:
 - a corporation or an organization domiciled in the U.S.; or
 - a U.S. branch office of a foreign company registered or authorized to do business in one or more U.S. states or territories; or
 - a U.S. federal, state or local government entity; or
 - a U.S. citizen or permanent legal resident.
 - ✓ A U.S. Nationally Interested Party does not include employees of other ISO or IEC National Member Bodies (NMB). Such employees should participate in international standards development through their own NMB.
- ANSI accreditation requirements are distinct
 - ANSI Annual Compliance Forms are distinct
 - ANSI Annual Reporting Requirement exists for TAGs but not ASDs (ASDs are audited)

ASD and TAG - Distinctions (3)

- Oversight of ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAGs to ISO and of ASDs, however, is by the ANSI Executive Standards Council (ExSC)
 - ANSI ExSC is also responsible for maintenance of ANSI's related procedures
