A global framework for technical harmonization

- World Trade Organization: 153 countries are signatories (as of July 2008)
- Multiplication of bilateral and regional trade agreements: more than 200 identified by WTO
- Good regulatory practice by referencing (international) standards, as a component of good public governance
- Big emerging economies: China, India, Brazil...
- Institutional framework for responding to climate change
- Global companies
- Increasing influence of global societal NGOs
- The UN Millenium Goals



ISO's global networking activities

- WTO: observer status and collaboration
- UN and UN agencies: CODEX, ILO, IMO, ITC, UPU, UN/ECE, UNIDO, WHO, WMO, WTO-Tourism,...
- World Customs Organization (WCO)
- 720 liaisons and partnerships with international and regional organizations in technical work
- Links with seven regional bodies (ACCSQ, AIDMO, ARSO, CEN, COPANT, EASC, PASC)

- Policy development committees: P-member in CASCO, DEVCO, REMCO and COPOLCO
- **Participation in 85%** of the active TCs and PCs:
 - 81% as P-member and among which ANSI holds 123 secretariats
 - 7% as O-member
- Involvement of ANSI in the governance over the years
 - 4 Presidents, 2 Vice-Presidents
 - ANSI hosted :
 - -- 2 General assemblies in New-York and Washington,
 - -- 2 COPOLCO meetings in Orlando and Washington,
 - -- an ITSIG meeting in New-York
