# CEN and CENELEC

- ❑ 31 full members each – “National Standards Bodies” and “National Committees” :
  - 27 in the European Union
  - Iceland, Norway, Switzerland, Croatia
  - Most – but not all – members are in common
- ❑ Affiliate members:
  - EU applicant countries (Balkans, Turkey)
  - Mediterranean basin EU trading partners
- ❑ Associate members/co-operating partners:
  - Industry associations at European level
  - Stakeholder organizations (SMEs, consumers, environment etc)
- ❑ CEN links globally to ISO, CENELEC to IEC

# ETSI

- 752 members from 62 countries:
  - 605 Full Members from 40 CEPT countries (including the 27 EU and 3 EFTA countries)
  - 121 Associate Members (20 non-CEPT countries) plus 25 Observer Members
- Members include administrations, network operators, manufacturers, service providers, academia, societal stakeholders, etc.
- Direct membership - but formal European Standards from ETSI meet the same requirements as those from CEN and CENELEC
- Standardizes telecommunications and related areas, often in partnership with other regional and national bodies

# Making one European market

## □ European Standards (ENs):

- Over 23.000 ENs exist today, with about 1.000 new publications every year
- Required to be implemented as national standards, conflicting national standards must be withdrawn
- 46% in CEN and CENELEC are identical or similar to international standards
- About 20% of CEN-CENELEC-ETSI ENs give presumption of conformity to single market legislation (“the new approach”)

- Technical Specifications, ETSI Standards, CEN-CENELEC Workshop Agreements, ETSI Industry Specifications, Technical Reports and Guides

# National processes

- ❑ A fundamental for European Standards
- ❑ National processes play a fundamental role in their creation and approval
- ❑ The ESOs differ in detail:
  - Participation in CEN and CENELEC Technical Committees is based on national delegations
  - Participation in ETSI Technical Committees is open to ETSI members (direct participation model)
- ❑ For public comment, formal voting and implementation, all European Standards have the same process
- ❑ The national public approval ensures a level playing-field and full consensus in formal standards

## The “New Approach” – how it works

- ❑ European legislation governs placing of products on the market – covers issues such as safety, electro-magnetic compatibility, etc.
- ❑ ONE means of conforming with the legal requirements is to conform with certain European Standards
- ❑ The ESOs agree the content (though often identical to the International Standard)
- ❑ The European Commission lists the relevant standards (“harmonised standards” as ensuring compliance with the legal requirements
- ❑ This does not make standards obligatory - any manufacturer or importer is free to use OTHER means to demonstrate compliance

## In a nutshell

- European Standards:
  - a powerful and efficient tool to **build a single European Market through ONE standard**
  - a successful example of **co-regulation practices**
  - a way to enhance **global relevance and global harmonization** through the **use of international standards**
  
- A voluntary system:
  - Ensuring the fullest possible participation – consumers, users, SMEs, etc
  - **Flexible and fast** (3 years max for an full Standard, less for other documents)

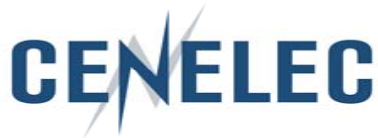
