ction and Reaction: Developing a sustainable approach to emerging chemical issues will bring together stakeholders from the public and private sectors to address the mounting pressure on global manufacturers arising from chemical controls and government regulatory programs such as REACH, RoHS, WEEE, SAICM and GHS. Affected areas include chemical security, waste management, energy efficiencies, and other environmental and production activities.

The conference will launch a collaborative initiative aimed at balancing the economic impact of these controls and regulations with activities that help to promote and enhance safety, health and the quality of life.

During the two-day conference, high-level experts from industry, government and the international community will share their perspectives on "green" chemistry issues, chemical controls, and the economic impact of chemical regulations on producers and users in the global marketplace.

Two sets of breakout sessions will engage attendees more actively in the dialogue. Topics are expected to include cross-cutting chemical issues such as life cycle and risk assessments, as well as environmental impact tools during product design and development. The inconsistent implementation of domestic and foreign chemical codes, standards and regulations - and the impediment this causes to the development of global supply chains - will also be examined.

Through written submittals and a facilitated dialogue, participants will help to identify existing programs, initiatives, and applicable standards and compliance programs; they will also work to identify gaps and areas where improvements may be needed. A conference report will contain background information, problem statements, resources, and recommendations for coordinated strategies and action plans.
