
Note: ANSI-Accredited U.S. TAGs to ISO and ISO/IEC JTC 1 have separate accreditation requirements




ANSI-Accredited Standards Developers (ASD) & American National Standards (ANS)

- 234 ANSI-accredited standards developers (ASD) <u>www.ansi.org/asd</u>
 - ANSI Essential Requirements: due process requirements for American National Standards (<u>www.ansi.org/essentialrequirements</u>)
 - "ANSI Essential Requirements" governs ANS process
 - ASD's accredited procedures reflect and implement the ANSI Essential Requirements
 - Only ASDs may submit standards for approval as ANS
 - Accreditation by ANSI is a pre-condition for submitting a standard for approval as an ANS (ANSI ExSC accredits procedures, ANSI BSR approves ANS)
 - All ANS are maintained on a regular cycle to ensure currency
 - Some 14,000 American National Standards
 - All ASDs are subject to ANSI's neutral third-party oversight including a regular procedural audit
 - Not all standards developed by these organizations are approved as ANS
 - ANSI recognizes multiple paths to standards development

Maintaining Accreditation as an ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD)

4.1.3 of the ANSI Essential Requirements

 Annual payment of ANSI Membership or equivalent Maintenance of Accreditation Fee

(www.ansi.org/membership)

- ✓ Invoices were issued in 2024, so if your organization has not received one, please send an email to membership@ansi.org or psa@ansi.org
- Annual payment of National Activity Assessment (NAA) based on the number of ANS maintained, e.g., \$3095 for 0-3 ANS
 - ✓ Helps defray the cost of the ANS infrastructure
 - ✓ Covers the cost of the routine Audit (if 5 years' worth of National Activity Assessment fees have been paid)
 - ✓ Timely payment required to maintain accreditation

Maintaining Accreditation as an ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD)

4.1.3 of the ANSI Essential Requirements

- Submit to regular audits or if "0" ANS, then a periodic reaccreditation with justification is required until an ANS is approved
 - ✓ Typically a 5-year audit cycle of ANS and Technical Reports (TRs) registered with ANSI
 - ✓ Procedural compliance audit

- Annual Compliance Form and binding certification today's focus
- Accreditation and reaccreditation of procedures

 - accreditation-related issues (procedures, scopes)
 - proposed and approved American National Standards
- Required timely maintenance of ANS
 - Remember 5 year maintenance cycle & 10 year automatic expiration
- Routine Audit (5 yr cycle), Special Audit for cause (as determined by the ANSI ExSC), Accreditation justification at 5 year mark if 0 ANS in progress

ANS checks and balances continued...

- BSR-9/Evidence of consensus review by ANSI Board of Standards Review
 (BSR) and staff at the BSR's direction (see ANSI BSR's Operating Procedures
 2022 edition)
 - ✓ BSR-9/BSR 109 Certification Statement, which is binding (109=Audited Designators only)
 - Use of 2022 BSR-9/109 is required
- Withdrawal for cause option (including remand of ANS as a result of an audit or appeal)
- Opportunity to propose revisions to the ANSI Essential Requirements (and other ANS-related procedures)
 - Through the ANSI ExSC (see later slides)

2.6 Consideration of views and objections

✓ Clarification that this section applies to **negative** votes

2.6 Consideration of views and objections

Prompt consideration shall be given to the written views and objections of all participants, including those commenting on the PINS announcement or public comment listing in *Standards Action*.

In connection with an objection articulated during a public comment period, or submitted with a **negative** vote, an effort to resolve all expressed objections accompanied by comments related to the proposal under consideration shall be made, and each such objector shall be advised in writing (including electronic communications) of the disposition of the objection and the reasons therefor.

New Footnote references 2.5.2: 8 Any substantive change made in a proposed American National Standard shall also be listed for public comment in accordance with 2.5.2 Public Review.

4.2 Approval of actions in connection with American National Standards

A standard developed by an ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer may be approved as an American National Standard by the ANSI Board of Standards Review (BSR) or by an ANSI Audited Designator. In either case, the essential due process and consensus criteria defined herein shall apply. In addition, approval assures the user that each American National Standard is generally acceptable to those that participated in the development of consensus for the standard.

Evidence of procedural compliance in support of the approval of a A-proposed new American National Standard or a proposed revision or reaffirmation of an American National Standard to be approved by the BSR-shall be submitted-included in the BSR-9 submittal. The BSR-9 shall be provided to the secretary of the BSR within one (1) year from the close of the comment period listed in Standards Action, using the appropriate form unless the standards developer notifies the secretary of the BSR in writing of good cause for a different schedule for submittal. Failure to make the submittal within two (2) years from the close of the comment period listed in Standards Action shall require consideration by the BSR, i.e., withdrawal, extension for cause, or another listing in Standards Action. ANSI-Accredited Standards Developers that have been granted the status of ANSI Audited Designator shall take action in connection with candidate American National Standards in a timeframe that is consistent with that specified for all other ANSI-Accredited Standards Developers.

4.2.1 Approval by the ANSI Board of Standards Review

Approval, withdrawal, revision or reaffirmation of an American National Standard is based on the evidence submitted that the requirements set forth herein have been met.

The ANSI Board of Standards Review (BSR) shall review standards-BSR-9 submittals submitted to ANSI-with unresolved objections on record. This includes negative consensus body votes as well as public review comments. Standards submitted without objections and identical national adoptions processed in accordance with the expedited procedures contained in the ANSI Procedures for the National Adoption of ISO and IEC Standards as American National Standards may be administratively approved by the BSR. The BSR does not have jurisdiction over the standards of ANSI Audited Designators unless an ANSI Audited Designator chooses to submit one or more standards to the BSR for approval.



4.0 & 4.5 Translations of ANS

4.0: The official language of the American National Standards (ANS) process, including all decisions made by ANS Program Oversight Committees, is English. The only version of a standards developer's procedures that are accredited by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI), and the only version of a document approved by ANSI as an ANS, is the English language version.

Footnote: An ANS that is an identical national adoption of an ISO or IEC standard which has been translated officially by ISO or IEC may carry the ANS mark. A modified national adoption may not.

4.5 Publication of ANS

American National Standards shall be published <u>in English</u> and made available as soon as possible, but no later than six months after approval as an American National Standard (ANS). The standards developer shall publish the standard or grant the right of publication to ANSI. The ANS mark and the words "an American National Standard" may appear on the English-language version of an ANS only and not on a translation of an ANS.

If an American National Standard is not published within six months following its approval, the standards developer may request an extension of this deadline from the BSR or its designee. Such a request shall be in writing, shall supply the reason for the delay, and shall indicate a firm final date for publication. At its discretion, the BSR or its designee may grant an additional period of time for publication. Audited Designators are not required to request an extension, but shall ensure an equivalent publication schedule and maintain documentation related to any publication delays.

The BSR or its designee shall-may publish a notice in *Standards Action* of intent to withdraw approval if the standards developer a) fails to publish the standard or fails to grant ANSI the right to publish within six months after its approval as an American National Standard and does not request an extension of the deadline despite follow-up or b) fails to meet the extended deadline.

Combined Publications

Documents that are published to include the English-language ANS, along with a translation of the ANS, in one "book" are required to include the following disclaimer (or equivalent) on the translated version:

• This document is a translation of the English-language version of an American National Standard. The only version approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) is the English-language version.

or

• This document is a translation of the English-language version of ANSI/ABC 123-2025 (sample designation). The only version approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) is the English-language version.

or

• The English-language version of this translated copy of ABC 123-2025 was approved as an American National Standard on Month/Day/Year.

Freestanding Publications

Documents that are freestanding translations of ANS may, but are not required to, include the following optional language:

This document is a translation of the English-language version of an American National Standard (ANS). The only version
approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) is the English-language version.

or

This document is a translation of the English-language version of ANSI/ABC 123-2025 (sample designation). The only version
approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) as an American National Standard (ANS) is the English-language
version.

or

• The English-language version of this translated copy of ANSI/ABC 123-2025 (or ABC 123-2025) was approved as an American National Standard (ANS) on Month/Day/Year.

Overview of revisions in 2025

Summary of revisions

- New footnote added to section 1.0 General to reflect current ANSI Policy codified by the ANSI Board of Directors Executive Committee, effective January 1, 2023.
- Revision of 4.0 Periodic Review updates requirements associated with the maintenance of National Adoptions of ISO and IEC Standards as ANS and clarifies requirements for withdrawn national adoptions.
- Revision of Annex B: Designation, Maintenance and Publication of a National Adoption of an ISO or IEC Standard to better align with ISO/IEC Guide 21 and ANSI's related policies.

New Footnote to reflect 2023 Board Policy

Decisions made by TAG Administrators under the ANSI Policy Regarding Rights to Nationally Adopt IEC and ISO Standards or Otherwise Use IEC and ISO Material are final and not subject to appeal at ANSI through its Program Oversight Committees or otherwise.



4.0 Periodic Maintenance

An ANS that is an identical or modified adoption of an ISO or IEC standard does not have to be reaffirmed according to the schedule applicable to other American National Standards, but rather action to reaffirm may be initiated at the same time that the corresponding ISO or IEC standard is reaffirmed by the respective organization, or within six months of such action.

If the ISO or IEC standard has been withdrawn, revised or superseded, similar action shall be considered by the adopting ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD), and if similar action is desired, shall be initiated within six months of the international action.

If the ISO or IEC standard that was nationally adopted as an ANS is withdrawn or superseded by ISO or IEC, then action to withdraw it as a current national adoption by the ASD shall be initiated within six months of the international action. If the standards developer no longer has the national adoption rights under the ANSI Policy Regarding Rights to Nationally Adopt IEC and ISO Standards or Otherwise Use IEC and ISO Material with regard to the ISO or IEC standard, then the related ANS shall be withdrawn by the ASD.

If the withdrawn national adoption is to be made available for historical reference and/or purchase, the ASD must have a contract with ANSI in place for this purpose.

Annex B: B.2 Methods of adoption notice (or Public Notification of the National Adoption of an ISO or IEC Standard as an American National Standard)

The adoption of an ISO or IEC standard shall ensure that the identification of the ISO or IEC standard is clearly stated. There are two methods for the adoption of ISO or IEC Standards:

Endorsement method: only applicable to identical adoptions. Upon approval as an American National Standard an announcement in *Standards Action* shall be made. The standard adopted shall reference the ISO or IEC designation.

Republication: there are three methods of republication: reprinting, translation (with or without reprint of the original), and redrafting. Independent of which method of republication is chosen, a A regional or national identifier of the organization adopting the ISO or IEC standard shall appear on the cover page and all other pages of the regional or national standard. In addition, the degree of correspondence to the ISO or IEC standard shall be stated in a prominent position and shall include the ISO or IEC reference number and year, and international title if different from the national title. (Examples: titles the same – Identical to ISO 11111: 2000; title different – Modified adoption of ISO 11111: 2000, Widgets.)

With particular reference to the development of electronic versions of standards, standards bodies may find new methods of adoption which are not covered in the ISO/IEC Guide 21, or may combine the existing ones. In this case the method used will not be listed here. However, the recommendations regarding choice and indication of correspondence will still remain applicable.

For further information concerning adoption methods described above and for methods of indicating technical deviations and editorial changes, please consult ISO/IEC Guide 21.

Annex B: Designation, Maintenance and Publication

B.3.2 <u>Designating-national standards that are modified adoptions of ISO or IEC Standards</u>

When a national standard is a modified version of an ISO or IEC standard, ISO or IEC should not be part of the alpha-numeric designation. The degree of correspondence should appear after the regional or national standard title and the reference number of the International Standard, including its date. For modified adoptions, only a regional or national reference number is permitted; that is, neither of the alternatives given in B.3.1 a) or b) is permitted.

An example of an acceptable designation of a modified national adoption follows, where XYZ is the ASD's acronym:

XYZ 2345:1993, Current transformers (IEC 60185:1987, MOD)

- Includes binding certification by ASD of overall procedural compliance
 - ✓ Audit: Please submit your Compliance Form on time even if your organization is undergoing a current audit and your procedures will eventually be updated, just note this on the form
- Every separate accreditation requires return of a Compliance E-mail/Form

So let's review the timeline again...

- January 13, 2025 Compliance Form issued via E-mail
- March 5, 2025 Compliance Form due to psa@ansi.org
 - ✓ Indicates compliance with the entire Essential Requirements (not just 2025 edition changes)
- March 5, 2026 Final deadline for submitting revised procedures related to 2025 Compliance Form (E-mail)
 - ✓ Revised procedures may be submitted any time, but must be submitted *timely* in connection with any changes
 - ✓ Must be submitted in strike-through-underline format with explanation (ExSC requirement)
 - ✓ Remember, the revisions are limited, so don't delay

Failure to return Compliance Form timely (which we know will not happen...)

- The ANSI Executive Standards Council (ExSC), which is the accrediting body, will be advised and your organization's status as an ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer (ASD) will be reviewed and could be suspended.
 - Progression of actions: Reminder to primary ASD accreditation contact, note to boss on behalf of ExSC, public listing in SA
 - Audit finding
- Note: You may (are expected to) also submit overdue compliance forms from past years – this is an Audit finding

Friendly Reminders

- Balance: Please remember to undertake and document targeted outreach if an ANS consensus body is not balanced. The ANSI Board of Standards Review (BSR) expects to see evidence of targeted outreach to relevant underrepresented stakeholders (including targeted outreach directed toward those outside of your organization's membership). Targeted outreach is different from general outreach and includes the names/definitions of the specific interest categories in which consensus body participation is sought. See also existing guidance documents at www.ansi.org/asd.
- ANS Data Maintenance: All ASDs are encouraged to review regularly the updated <u>Lists of Approved and Proposed ANS</u> that are available in pdf and excel formats. Regular review of these reports will support the timely maintenance of each ASD's proposed and approved ANS, as well as assist with meaningful coordination efforts among ASDs. Specific updates to these lists may be sent by an ASD to <u>psa@ansi.org</u>. (Note that a direct link to these lists is also available on the <u>Standards Action</u> page.) These reports are also used as the basis for annual billing, so it's important for you to review and update them during the course of every year.
- ANS Website/Education: Please review the recently updated and enhanced ANS pages on ANSI's website. These pages may be useful to your organization's staff and those who participate in the standards development process. See www.ansi.org and select "American National Standards" from the top bar. In particular, you'll note two paths that walk the reader through ANSI's requirements: 1) General public; and 2) Standards Developers. Please also take a look at the updated ANSI-Accredited Standards Developer list.
- ANS Guidance: Please take advantage of the many guidance documents that address the ANS process. These are available at www.ansi.org/asd and through the "Resource Center" tab, by selecting "American National Standards".
- ANS Data Submittal/Forms: We hope you have found the ANS-related webforms easy to use. 

- Proposed procedural revisions to the ANSI ER:
 - Proposal submitted to <u>psa@ansi.org</u> (strikethrough, underline with rationale)
 - Proposal reviewed by the ANSI Executive Standards Council (ExSC)
 - If supported, proposal announced in *Standards Action* (www.ansi.org/standardsaction)
 - Public comments reviewed and responded to by the ANSI ExSC
 - If supported after public review, then ANSI ExSC submits to ANSI Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for final approval
 - Revision incorporated into the next annual (January) edition of the ANSI Essential Requirements
