# **Summary of Key Points and Meeting Outcomes**

On April 29, Workcred hosted the Government Credentialing Network, bringing together representatives from federal agencies and vendors to discuss initiatives relating to the quality and market value of credentials. The Network is intended to provide an effective and efficient forum for federal participants to share valuable information and insights about certifications, as well as related developments in policy, research, and statistics.

Now a formal group under <u>Workcred's governance structure</u>, the Government Credentialing Network recently expanded to include both the participants of the ANSI-hosted Federal Interagency Meetings on Certifications and the Federal Roundtable on Non-Degree Credentials hosted by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) in the U.S. Department of Education.

#### **Discussion of Government Credentialing Network Objectives**

Following brief introductions, Dr. Cynthia Woodley, chair of the Government Credentialing Network, led an interactive discussion on the Network's guiding purposes, which resulted in the updated **Government Credentialing Network**Objectives document. Specific objectives of the Network include:

- Identify where, how, and why the federal government uses credentialing
- Identify the various roles of industry and professional organizations in the creation of workforce credentials and the working relationships between industry and the federal government
- Review the purpose, mission, and legislation mandate of a government agency and its alignment with its credentialing role
- Identify federal credentialing models and share best practices to build more consistency among federal agencies in regard to specific credentials (i.e. terminology, validation)
- Keep abreast of legislation and regulation affecting credentialing, and provide input to ensure consistency in credentialing terminology and concepts
- Identify new credentialing initiatives in the federal government
- Identify trends and practices through the analysis of big data and new statistics from federal surveys including the Current Population Survey and the Adult Training and Education Survey
- Identify the need for and create workshops/conferences focusing on federal agencies and credentialing
- Communicate findings and information with the broader community
- Identify and share metrics for evaluating program effectiveness

Moving forward, meeting recaps and presentations will be shared with the full list of Network invitees (including those who were unable to attend a meeting) in order to create greater continuity between meetings.

#### **Better Buildings Workforce Guidelines Presentation**

Roger Grant, program director at the National Institute of Building Sciences (NIBS) provided an in-depth presentation on the Better Buildings Workforce Guidelines, an initiative led by the U.S. Department of Energy and NIBS, with industry input. The guidelines are intended to help enhance and streamline commercial building workforce training and certification programs. Until now, there have been no national guidelines for energy efficiency-related professional credentials, posing a barrier to the quality, consistency, and scalability of this workforce.

#### **GEMEnA Presentation on New Data**

Sharon Boivin, chair of the Federal Interagency Working Group on Expanded Measures of Enrollment and Attainment (GEMEnA), provided a lively update on GEMEnA's progress in collecting new data on the prevalence and key characteristics of certifications, licenses, and educational certificates. GEMEnA works to develop and validate national measures of the participation in and credentialing of education and training for work, and to build government-wide consensus for the adoption of these measures in key federal data collections. The working group is engaged in a rigorous process of survey item development to validate core items on 1) the attainment of non-degree credentials, including industry-recognized certifications, occupational licenses, and educational certificates, and 2) enrollment in education and training that prepares people for work.

#### **Federal Interagency Workshops Discussion and Next Steps**

Deanna Hudella of Pearson VUE and Roy Swift of Workcred sought input from participants on a <u>proposal</u> to create Federal Interagency Workshops. As proposed, the workshops would be intended to provide an interactive forum for education and networking of certification professionals working in the federal market; the target audience would include program leads for federal certification programs and federal employees that are involved with managing a certification program.

Possible topics that emerged from the discussion included: Models of Credentialing in the Federal Government, Role of Legislation in Credentialing, Veterans, Badging, Emerging Methods, Developing Items for Exams, and Remote Proctoring in the Federal Government.

**ACTION**: Network participants agreed that a steering committee should be formed (with at least 50% agency representation) to shape the proposed workshops and present a proposal at the next Network meeting.
