

Objectives of Government Credentialing Network Updated April 29, 2015

- Identify where, how, and why the federal government uses credentialing
- Identify the various roles of industry and professional organizations in the creation of workforce credentials and the working relationships between industry and the federal government
- Review the purpose, mission, and legislation mandate of a government agency and its alignment with its credentialing role
- Identify federal credentialing models and share best practices to build more consistency among federal agencies in regard to specific credentials (i.e. terminology, validation)
- Keep abreast of legislation and regulation affecting credentialing, and provide input to ensure consistency in credentialing terminology and concepts
- Identify new credentialing initiatives in the federal government
- Identify trends and practices through the analysis of big data and new statistics from federal surveys including the Current Population Survey and the Adult Training and Education Survey
- Identify the need for and create workshops/conferences focusing on federal agencies and credentialing
- Communicate findings and information with the broader community
- Identify and share metrics for evaluating program effectiveness

Proposed Process Recommendations

- 1. Increase the meetings from two to three times per year
- 2. Increase the length of time of the meetings from four to five hours
- 3. Ask a few agencies to present their own models in-depth at each meeting; provide adequate time for Q&A and open discussion
- 4. Create action items based on meeting discussions
- 5. Create continuity between meetings for those not attending each network event (i.e., share meeting recap and presentations)
- 6. Consider creating federal agency workshops based on discussions
